

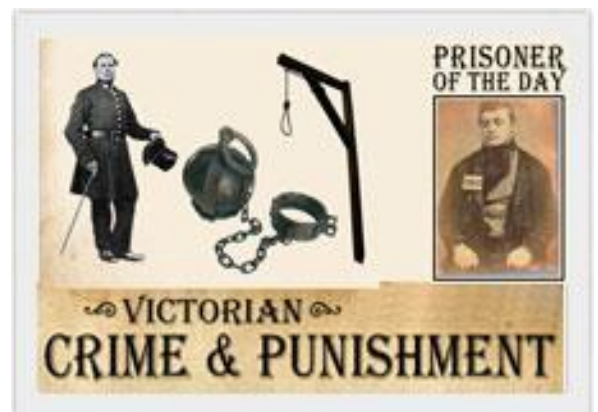
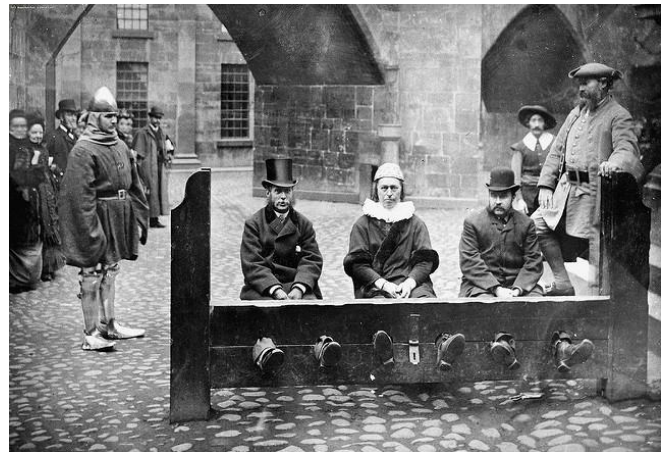
We will be:
